## **Our Grant Recipients** Keep Growing... **Growing...Growing**by Susan May, Outgoing Grants Chair

Our 2017 Annual Meeting created another exciting opportunity to celebrate the pooled-fund grants process. Due to our growth in membership and the generosity of all members, we were able to award six grants and still have more than \$36,000 in reserve for our next biennial grant. We also made a \$1,000 contribution to each of the four "runners-up" on the ballot. Of our six grants winners only one had previously received an IWCF grant.

The pooled-fund grants awards have grown to 87! Our community impact continues to grow, and these 2017 grantees will employ our funds to expand their efforts to improve and change lives in the following ways:

#### **Cultural Arts**

Boise Contemporary Theater will remodel a loft to create an affordable, dedicated space for young artists to practice and perform inspiring new works for our community.

#### Education

Lee Pesky Learning Center will provide mental health support for students at Meridian Elementary through training and ongoing classroom mentoring.

## IWCF Grants Assessment and Impact Committee

Review of Progress Reports, May 2017, by Deb Holleran



In May, the Grant Assessment and Impact Committee (GAI) reviewed progress reports from three, 2015 multi-year grant winners (Feed the Gap, Good Samaritan Home and Idaho Children's Trust Fund); one,

2016 multi-year grant winner (Children's Free Dental Clinic); and the 2016 ABC grant winner (Valley Regional Transit) for disbursal of \$60,000 in IWCF grant monies. The GAI receives progress reports from all of our grant award winners at sixmonth intervals during the life of the grant.

These five organizations shared exciting highlights regarding the impact our pooled-fund grant monies have had within their communities. Here are a few excerpts:

The Good Samaritan Home's completion of their extensive remodeling projects brought the Home into the 21st century, up-to-code on building requirements and is providing a "homey" atmosphere rather than an institutional one. An Open House is scheduled for Friday, July 7 from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. at 3501 W. State Street, Boise. Please RSVP to the Home at (208) 343-6051.

The Children's Free Dental Clinic and their Miles of Smiles Dental Van Project was able to increase the number of children seen by their volunteer professionals and expand their clinical efforts to additional schools (6+ at this reporting period). One third grade student was so fearful, the treatment staff had to develop a specific plan to gradually ease her fears and gain her trust. Now a 6th grader, she is proud to show off her permanent teeth, with no cavities and a beautiful smile!

And, <u>Valley Regional Transit's</u> Mobile Village Van Service has seen a steady increase (9%) in employment agencies finding jobs for workers who are enrolled in the Village Van Service. Also, for the first 6 months since receiving their grant monies, approximately 30 individuals have used this service.

called us to order for the last time as president and reflected on our collective impact over the past year; Heather Jauregui greeted us with a smile as incoming president and shared the key initiatives planned for IWCF in the months ahead. Secretary Terry Anderson confirmed the approval of the membership's balloting of required business, bylaws updates, new budget, and new board of directors.

The climax was the Grants Presentation! IWCF members invested a total of \$165,500 in six worthy projects, each



described by a grantee representative. After hearing from them, at the end of the evening we went home inspired, knowing how much we affect positive change through our thoughtful pooled-fund giving.

## **Boise Parks: No Longer** Just Playgrounds by Jo Anne Minnick, Education Committee

On the morning of March 21, 2017, IWCF members and guests gathered at the Boise Train Depot for an educational program on Boise Parks and Recreation and the city's green space. Parks Planner Jennifer Tomlinson shared information about the history, current status and future of our park facilities and recreation opportunities.



There are currently 77 developed and 13 undeveloped

parks in Boise. In addition to the better known regional and small neighborhood parks, the Boise Parks and Recreation Department maintains the grounds of the Anne Frank Memorial, Log Cabin Literary Center, Boise Train Depot, two cemeteries (Morris Hill and Pioneer) and two golf courses (Warm Springs and Quail Hollow), and assists with Idaho Ice World, Zoo Boise, Fort Boise Community Center, West Boise Aquatics Center and the Foothills Learning Center.

"Parks...are for a collective experience," Tomlinson explained. "The city is trying to create opportunities [for all] to get outside." Parks should be "accessible and close to where people live...[ideally within] a half-mile radius...Parks aren't just playgrounds anymore."

Parks and Rec tries to accommodate the wishes of community members. Two unique parks became realities as the result of recommendations from the public and much planning, hard work and cooperation by the city, businesses and Boise Parks and Rec.



1) Rhodes Skate Park in downtown Boise is recognized as a premiere skateboarding venue. On June 9 and 10, the national X Games qualifier was held there, televised on ESPN.

2) The new Whitewater Park for both kayakers and surfers is also attracting national attention. Phase 2 will increase the length of the runs and add seating and viewing areas for spectators.



Plans for the future include:


- Renovation of Ann Morrison Park
- Addition of a pickle ball court (Boise already has a cricket mound)
- Creation of a number of small urban parks with AstroTurf so downtown residents have places to walk their dogs
- A walking park no dogs
- Preservation of the Spaulding Ranch, a property near Cole and Mountain View recently purchased by the city, to be a working vintage farm used for educational purposes with actual crops grown, farm animals on site and machinery in use.



We all came away from the Boise Train Depot better informed about our parks and proud of our city for its accomplishments thus far in the wide range of experiences our parks offer. We look forward to what the future holds for our parks and recreational opportunities in Boise.

## Renewal Deadline Change
